

Write down your ideas and talk about them with your family or friends.





# The Artistic Processes

Recall the artwork you looked at earlier as you explore the artistic processes through the questions and activities below.



## Respond - Explore and Understand

- What **colors** do you see in the painting? Why do you think the artist chose to use these colors?
- What **objects** do you see in the painting? Are there two men or just one? How do you know?

### Connect - Relate to the Art

- How does the painting make you **feel**? Why?
- If you could **interview the artist**, what questions would you ask?

#### Create - Make Art

- Draw or paint your own **self-portrait**. For an added challenge, use only two or three colors.
- Imagine you are the artist in the painting. Write a poem, story, or play about your life.

### Present and Perform-Share Your Art

- **Share** your creations with your family or friends.
- Take a moment to tell them what you **discovered**.
